This exciting one act play takes the audience on an emotional trek through the lives of three dynamic women who helped shape their prairie town in Alberta. A one woman show where the actress becomes each of the characters. She transforms into each different character as she reaches into a hatbox and puts on a hat and a pair of gloves, for each different person.

A power-point slide show acts as a backdrop showing what the town looked like during each woman's life.

This is a positive and hopeful play that leaves the audience feeling inspired, proud and grateful.

The three women are from a variety of eras and backgrounds and nationalities.

"Hats And Gloves, Hard Work And Dreams" The half-hour long version has the following 3 prairie women

1. SISTER EMERY (Parisian French)

One of the first Grey Nuns (late 1800s) who nursed and comforted her town through the small pox epidemic. A warm and compassionate nurse who longs to save lives, and hopes and prays for the prairies to have a good hospital.

2. KATE MALONEY (Tough English Canadian)

A fun and confident career woman, (early 1900s) who worked as a midwife and lived on her own land, never choosing to marry, in an age where that was unheard of. She relays her memories of fear and armies during the Riel Rebellion and wishes for the prairies to never know war again, to be able to invest in parks and trails, instead of weapons.

3. MARY SERNOWSKI (Ukrainian)

The woman who told Lois Hole to sell a few flowers! A heart wrenching story of rags to riches. An emigrant from the Polish Ukraine who survived war and famine, only to struggle through the poverty of the depression. She is barefoot, and working on seeding herbs while she talks about her great love of the farmers market and it's customers, who she sees as beautiful in their diversity as the flowers in her garden. She wishes for Albertans to always look after it's poor and for the market to continue to grow and prosper.







"Hats And Gloves, Hard Work And Dreams" The hour long version has the following 6 prairie women

ROSE PLANTE NORMAND (Métis)

A Métis handy woman who helped plan and build the early mission with Father Lacombe in the mid 1800s. A down to earth character that just wishes that when a person wants to fix, or build something that the supplies were already here and available.

SISTER EMERY (Parisian French)

One of the first Grey Nuns (late 1800s) who nursed and comforted St. Albert through the small pox epidemic. A warm and compassionate nurse who longs to save lives, and hopes and prays for St. Albert to have a good hospital.

KATE MALONEY (Tough English Canadian)

An old time teacher who taught at the little white schoolhouse, and raised seven children on a farm without any water. Her story is one of strong moral convictions and much good advise for today's audience in regards to education, parenting and volunteering.

She wishes for all teachers to know the difference that they are making in the lives of the students. (1940s)
